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#### A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the third combined Strategic and Annual Programme Report for the EEA and Norway Grants 2014-2021, prepared by the Directorate General Growth (DG Growth), Ministry of Finance, acting as the National Focal Point (NFP) and the Programme Operator (PO) of the Programme "Local Development and Poverty Reduction".

The Report is prepared in accordance with Article 2.6 of the Regulation of the EEA and Norway Financial Mechanisms 2014-2021 and it reflects the progress made for the Programme in the period January-December 2021.

Twelve pre-defined projects are under implementation in the period under review. One project contract was signed in April 2021, whereas the other eleven project contracts were signed in July-September 2020.

The mid-term review was completed in December 2021 with the approval by the Donors of the allocation of the Reserve amount of €347.300 to two of the pre-defined projects under the 'Local development and poverty reduction programme': "Multifunctional Community Centre for people with special needs" (€304.800) and "Solidarity Network Nicosia In Action (NicInAct)" (€42.500), where additional activities will reinforce the results of these projects and have a greater impact on their beneficiaries.

Despite of COVID-19 pandemic, most of the projects have progressed in accordance with their timelines. However the cost of materials and equipment which had a significant rise due to COVID-19, had an impact on the projects' budgets. As the projects were in the first year of their implementation, it is premature to perceive the actual impact.

Another challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic was the impact on the bilateral relations, where the bilateral initiatives which were mainly expert exchanges, seminars and workshops, were held behind in the year under review. It is noted however, that some of the initiatives took place via on-line sessions. The NFP/PO was in communication with the Norwegian Embassy in Athens and the FMO in order to find new bilateral partners as well as new ways of promoting bilateral initiatives.

During the year, the Grants received public exposure through information and publicity events from the project promoters of the projects implemented under the EEA and Norway Grants as well through the social media of the National Focal Point/Programme Operator. A highlight was the visit to Cyprus of the Norwegian Ambassador in Athens in October 2021, where he visited a number of projects and discussed with the project promoters the progress and future plans of the projects.

Considering all the challenges faced in 2021, the NFP/PO and the project promoters, continued to work with dedication and enthusiasm towards achieving the project results and reaching the targets agreed in the Programme Agreement.



#### **B. PERFORMANCE**

#### **CY-LOCALDEV Local Development and Poverty Reduction**

#### 1. Programme context

In this section, reference is made on the political, legislative and economic developments in Cyprus that could affect the implementation of the Programme "Local Development and Poverty Reduction".

The projects under the Programme cover a number of different sectors of the Cyprus economy and society, such as the areas of environment, health, culture and social welfare. All these projects aim to contribute to the goal of reducing social and economic disparities in the EEA area and strengthening bilateral relations.

#### **Environment**

The pandemic crisis has demonstrated the need to invest more in environmentally friendly technologies and leverage the climatological realities of Cyprus to invest in energy production that comes from nature as means of creating a positive impact in the efficiency and effectiveness. The crisis demonstrates the need for changes and improvements in the technologies used.

The aim is the transition to climate neutrality, through the achievement of the national targets in energy efficiency and renewable energy for 2030. Specifically, Cyprus is committed to increase the share of Renewable Energy Sources (RES) to 23% of the total gross final energy consumption and to 26% of the total gross final electricity consumption, as well as to maintain 39% in heating and cooling and 14% in the transport sector.

In view of the European Green Deal towards climate neutral economy, the Cyprus government has introduced significant measures contributing to climate neutrality, including sustainable transport, circular economy, renewable energy, improving waste management, reducing air-pollution, protecting the biodiversity and sustainable production.

The main objective is to design and plan the cost-effective policies and measures that will help to achieve the medium and long-term national energy and climate goals, contribute to the economic development and respond to the challenge of other environmental goals.

Furthermore, in the Cyprus Recovery and Resilience Plan 2021-2026, the aim under climate and energy efficiency is to support schemes so as to assist households, enterprises, municipalities, communities and the wider public sector and NGOs to



implement energy efficiency and renewable energy investments. In this respect, investments related to the energy upgrade of public buildings and other public infrastructure, including in the water treatment sector will be promoted. Also, incentives for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions in agriculture, industries, businesses and other organisations, are also planned.

Moreover, it is considered of utmost importance that national authorities minimise the risk of forest fires within or near the Cyprus State Forests and enable faster and more effective intervention of the fire fighting forces, and hence reduce the possibility of small forest fires growing big and threaten the forests with partial or complete destruction. Equally important is to enhance citizens' safety, protect their property and preserve the natural environment from the forest fires. This will be achieved through the purchase of firefighting aircraft, vehicles, equipment and provision of services, such as firefighting operations and training.

During 2021, 74 forest fires were recorded that burned more than 100 square kilometres in total. However, the most devastating fire of 2021, both in terms of damage and in terms of victims, was the fire that broke out in June 2021 in the mountainous areas of Limassol and Larnaca districts. A total number of eight communities were evacuated due to the large fire, while four people were found dead. The area of the burned land exceeded 55 square kilometers with houses and agricultural crops completely destroyed.

Another big forest fire of 2021, occurred in June near Agia Marina Xyliatou in the Nicosia District, where the fire burned 28 square kilometers, mostly of forest land.

#### <u>Health</u>

In the area of public health, the COVID-19 pandemic revealed some structural problems as to the coordination of actions, long-term planning and monitoring techniques.

The recent pandemic further highlighted the importance of the preparedness of the health system, both in the public and private sectors, so as to deal with emergencies and also provide assistance for the benefit of the whole society.

The strategic goals of the Ministry of Health are related to the implementation of sustainable reforms within a healthcare system that focuses on prevention, social provision and continuous upgrading of the provided services based on good practices and accessibility, equally to all citizens.

A key characteristic of the recently implemented, as of June 2019, General Health System (GHS), is the enhanced access of all citizens to healthcare services. The COVID-19 pandemic demonstrated the need to further improve and modernise the health care system and complete the implementation of the sector reform.



In this framework, one of the main targets of the Cyprus Resilience and Recovery Plan 2021-2026, is the establishment of a Resilient and Effective Health System with the promotion of reforms and investments in the healthcare sector that will increase the efficiency, accessibility and overall resilience of the GHS.

To this end, it includes specific measures towards the development of policies and monitoring of key metrics to support data-driven decisions leading to assurance of adequate supplies and infrastructure that will improve the capacity of hospital units and the working conditions of health staff. In addition, it will provide the digitalisation of cross border healthcare and surveillance of infectious diseases, contributing to the digital transition and strengthening public health policies, assuring a patient-centred environment thus enriching social cohesion. Finally, it also includes incentives for hospitals to achieve a high level of standardised healthcare comparable to international standards and the accreditation of both private and public hospitals.

Another goal of the RRP is the development of the strategic plan and coordination capacity for the treatment of COVID-19 patients. By strengthening the capacity of the main COVID-19 Care Unit, the need for further Units in other hospitals to treat COVID-19 patients will reduce, increasing predictability and effectiveness, coherence and capacity in the treatment of COVID-19 patients.

#### **Migration and Asylum**

Cyprus, due to its geographical location near the Middle East, continues to receive disproportionate numbers of refugees and asylum seekers from Asia and the Middle East, compared to its capacity. The problems faced by Cyprus are magnified even more due to the flow of immigrants from the areas of the occupied part of Cyprus where the government of the Republic has no control. According to the latest data, refugees and asylum seekers account to 4% of the Cyprus population, whereas the average for the EU is 1%.

For the management of the migration flows in Cyprus, the government tries to proceed with quick asylum procedures, ensuring that the real beneficiaries of international protection can in a short period, enjoy the benefits provided for by the international conventions as well as by national legislation.

The Asylum Service of the Ministry of Interior coordinates and supervises the operation and management of reception and accommodation centres for applicants of international protection and their families according to the Refugee Law. These Reception and Accommodation Centres play a significant role in the immediate provision of accommodation and hence of suitable reception conditions as provided by the relevant Reception Conditions Directive. More specifically, there are two main such facilities, the Emergency Reception Centre Pournara in the Nicosia District and the Kofinou Reception Centre for Asylum Seekers in the Larnaca District. In June 2021,



a number of housing units were delivered for the needs of the Reception Centre for Applicants for International Protection at "Limnes" in the Larnaca District.

In the migration flows there are also unaccompanied minors, mainly boys, aged 16-18, where the Social Services are responsible for their protection and wellbeing. In this respect, and in view of providing appropriate accommodation and relevant services (medical, legal, educational, etc.), a project under the EEA grants is under implementation with the renovation of a building in the Larnaca district.

#### **Social welfare**

The Labour market situation in Cyprus has deteriorated since the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic as a result of the economic contraction (negative growth rate of -5,1% in 2020) resulting in an upward trend of unemployment, especially amongst the most vulnerable. The unemployment rate in the first half of 2021 averaged at 8,5%, compared to 7,1% in the first half of 2020 and for the youth unemployment increased to 18,3% in the first half of 2021 compared to 16,2% in the corresponding half of 2020.

In order to support young unemployed people as well as the most vulnerable groups, the Ministry of Labour and Social Insurance works at strengthening outreach activities by building partnerships with local actors and introducing various schemes and programmes, through trainings and relevant information campaigns.

In accordance with the National Strategy on Social Policy, activities towards promoting children's welfare, active inclusion and combating poverty are high on the priorities of the Ministry of Labour and Social Insurance, as well as other stakeholders who are involved in improving the negative impact of economic crisis on the living conditions of vulnerable groups.

Furthermore, in July 2021 a Deputy Ministry for Social Welfare was established, in order to tackle more effectively all related issues. The Deputy Ministry aims at providing equal access to social services in an effective way, to all the people living in Cyprus, ensuring that vulnerable groups are protected through the improvement of their standard of living by providing the needed services and assistance.

#### Covid-19

The COVID-19 crisis had a negative impact on the economic development of Cyprus. All economic sectors were negatively affected. Unemployment, especially among the young people has increased. Cost of living has risen with significant increase in costs, especially of imported items, including fuel prices, affecting all areas of social and economic life.



The necessary measures taken by the government to protect public health as well as to address the consequences of the loss of jobs, productivity, and lockdowns, had unavoidably a significant impact on public finances.

As far as the social impact of the pandemic is concerned, it is noted that the adverse economic development resulted in a negative impact on the vulnerable groups. Therefore the EEA and Norway grants allocated in this programming period to support a number of projects, will further assist the efforts of society to provide high quality services to these groups.

As far as bi-communal cooperation is concerned, it is noted that this has not been impacted by Covid-19, as the projects are progressing without major problems.

#### Resilience and Recovery Plan (RRP)

The DG Growth, Ministry of Finance is the responsible authority for the Recovery and Resilience Plan (RRP) in Cyprus and it has created a new dedicated Directorate within the Directorate General so as to coordinate the work of the RRP. It has also recently employed new personnel to support the work on this Plan.

The work and capacity of the team at the DG Growth, Ministry of Finance, working on the EEA/Norway grants (NFP and PO), has not been affected by the RRP and it will not be affected in the future as the number of officers working on the grants will remain the same as described in the Management and Control Systems of the NFP and PO.

As far as the project promoters are concerned, as their projects are already well into implementation, with most of them planned to be completed by October 2023, they will not be affected by any future projects under the RRP that might be implemented by their departments/organisations.

Furthermore, the funds of the RRP will cover mostly <u>big infrastructural projects</u> and <u>grant schemes</u> in the policy areas of public health and civil protection, the green transition, economic resilience and competitiveness, the digital transition, the labour market, education and human capital, and they are expected to be implemented by 2026.

Given the nature and the timing of the RRP and taking into consideration the small amount of the EEA and Norway grants to Cyprus, it is not anticipated that these will have a negative impact on the current or the future EEA/Norway grants.

#### **DG EPCD Name Change**

After a Council of Ministers Decision on 7/10/2021 and Law (191)I of 2021, published in the Official Government Gazette on 21/12/2021, the name of the Directorate



General for European Programmes, Coordination and Development (DG EPCD) has been changed to Directorate General Growth, Ministry of Finance, as of 21/12/2021.

This name change of DG EPCD was considered necessary in the framework of the role of the DG EPCD which focuses on promoting long term sustainable development.

The duties of the NFP and PO remain the same, as well as the personnel within the DG Growth, Ministry of Finance, working on the EEA and Norway Grants.

Furthermore, it is noted that the DG Growth, Ministry of Finance, continues to work on the same issues as the DG EPCD with the same personnel and at the same premises.

#### 2. Results

# Outcome 1: Enhanced capacity to preserve the environment and improve air quality

### PDP 6 - Separate collection and management of hazardous waste produced by households

In August 2021 the Project Promoter (PP) signed a contract with the sub-contractor for the provision of the mobile units. The units are expected to be delivered by the end of in February 2022. Furthermore, in September 2021, the PP signed a contract with another sub-contractor in order to plan and apply the project's communication strategy. Both sub-contractors have been assigned by the PP through public procurement procedures.

In the meantime, the PP is also preparing all the other actions needed so that the four mobile units which will visit the various communities for the collection of hazardous waste produced by households, are ready to start visiting the communities by March 2022. These activities include the preparation for an event, the preparation of the advertising/ information material, the completion of the commercials of the project and the preparation of the list of the places that the units will visit.

#### PDP 7 - Reduction of risk of damage caused by wildfires in Cyprus' forests

The PP has signed the contracts for the purchase of the firefighting equipment and are expected to be delivered in 2022. The personal tools/personal equipment and the firefighting have already been delivered.

The communication campaign is progressing in line with the set timeframe and about 500 people participated at information seminars about forest fires (30 of them at a two days seminar (training of trainers – Forest Officers of the Department of Forests), 45



of them were volunteers at a two days seminar and the other 425 were forest firefighters and staff of the Department of Forests at one day seminar).

The PP, in cooperation with the Press and Information Office (PIO), produced 1 radio and 2 TV spots that have been broadcasted during the Forests Protection Week, in all the TV channels in Cyprus. Additionally, posters, road signs, information leaflet in Greek and English language, glass pad, mouse pads, caps and a rollup banner have been prepared and delivered at the Department with the Norway Grants logo to be used for the publicity and dissemination of the project.

# PDP 8 - Assessment of climate change effects on pollution in transport in Cyprus (ACCEPT)

Scientific progress at this stage is in line with the time-plan. Results that characterize the Saharan dust transport events and transport of volcanic ash from the eruption of Etna in March 2021 were presented. The Atmospheric Sensor development continues with efforts for assembling the equipment with calibration tests being performed at the Instrumentation & Nanotechnology Laboratory of the Cyprus Institute.

Additionally, the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA) authorized Balloon-UAV test flights up to 6Km, which is a significant development for the objectives of the project. A series of evaluation analyses of the pollution and dust model outputs has been performed by utilizing a variety of regional observations. The repositories were updated with the latest EURO-CORDEX projections for daily temperature and precipitation contributing to the quality checks and pre-process to extract the specific information for Cyprus.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> annual project meeting took place on the 20<sup>th</sup> of September 2021 and information and photos of the event were disseminated through the PPs social media channels.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> of October 2021, the Centre of Excellence (CARE-C) of the Cyprus Institute organised the "2nd International Conference on Climate Change in the Eastern Mediterranean and Middle East (EMME) - Pre-Conference Workshops". Following the Conference, a public webinar was held, where issues on air quality and climate change in Cyprus and their effects on human health were discussed.

Ten scientific researches were involved in the project, compared to the 4 researchers being the target value. The additional researchers are on a part-time basis working on the project, but it was necessary to involve them in order to achieve better results in the project implementation. In addition eight professional staff involved in the project participated in on-line training seminars.



#### Outcome 2: Improved access to health care

#### PDP 10 - Childhood Cancer Diagnostic Laboratory

The PP hired on 1/4/2021 and trained the three Laboratory assistants who will work on the project. The equipment NGS NexSeq Illumina 2000 was purchased and installed at the end of November 2021. The relevant equipment will enable the detection of genes relating to pediatric cancer in order to decide the best possible solution for the purposes of the relevant therapies.

As part of the Communications strategy, three TV spot-films were produced for bone marrow donor recruitment that were played on all major TV stations. Donor recruitment campaigns continued with the registration of about 2.000 new donors.

A comprehensive quality system was established, with the Karaiskakio Foundation Quality Management team undertaking the development and maintenance of the project's Quality System. The new diagnostic assay was verified under the established quality standards of the Karaiskakio Foundation and successfully accredited under the ISO field in September 2021.

Furthermore, 35 patients received the services of the Foundation, by the end of September 2021. The total number of patients for the duration of the project is 100 persons.

#### PDP 11 - New infrastructure for diagnosis and treatment of patients (CING)

Scientific progress at this stage is in line with the timeframe. The two of the three specialised equipment were installed and the third one will be installed in early 2022. Information about the project and the contribution of the Norway Grants has been disseminated in newspapers and online.

Several antibodies for the recognition of blood cell subpopulations have been tested and employed in an analysis of primary and immortal erythroid cells. The results have been peer-reviewed and published in the MDPI International Journal of Molecular Sciences, under the title "Distinct miRNA signatures and networks discern fetal from adult erythroid differentiation and primary from immortalized erythroid cells".

Moreover, a substantial review of the scientific area covered by the current grant has been published in MDPI Cells, Therapy Development by Genome Editing of Hematopoietic Stem Cells.

Both publications have acknowledged the contribution of the Norway Grants.



Furthermore, 68 professional staff was trained during four seminars in the period March-May 2021, in fields covering Genome Editing, neuropathologies and flow cytometry in the assessment of cell-based cancer therapies, with related surface markers. The number of trained professional surpassed the targeted value of 60 that was initially foreseen.

## PDP 12 - Centre for children and adolescents with neuro-developmental disorders (NDD)

The building where the centre will operate is at the final phase of preparation and the therapeutic equipment is expected to be purchased with the centre's operation. Two occupational therapists, a psychologist and an office staff have been hired, while the speech therapist is expected to be hired in early 2022. Meanwhile, the various therapies take place at the Makarios children's hospital, until the full operation of the centre at the new premises.

#### Outcome 3: Improved access to social and economic services

#### PDP 2 - Gastronomy from A to Z - Gastronomy School at Troodos area

The relevant documents of the tendering procedure for the construction of the Gastronomy Training Centre have been prepared by the architect and the engineering team. They need to be verified by the tendering department of the Limassol District Administration (the project partner, which is responsible for the construction of the Centre), before proceeding in the call for public tender in the first quarter of 2022. The contract is expected to be signed within 2022.

#### PDP 3 - Digitising the Museum of Cyprus

The PP hired eight archeologists in April 2021 and purchased the necessary equipment (laptops and monitors). On 1 May 2021, the 8 archeologists started the digitization process of the 96.000 movable antiquities stored in the Cyprus museum. A total of 10.681 movable antiquities were digitized until October 2021.

The PP sent to the PO on 30/9/2021, a request for a three month extension to the implementation of the project, due to COVID-19, and the new completion date of the project is now the 31<sup>st</sup> of January 2024.

#### PDP 4 - Multifunctional Community Centre for people with special needs

The construction activities proceeded as planned and the project is running smoothly and according to the plan. Some major activities completed are the basement dividing



walls, total insulation of basement internally and externally, structure and frame work along with the inclined roof, earthworks surrounding the basement walls, electrical and mechanical works related to the walls and drainage systems at the basement.

In the framework of the allocation of the Reserve amount of the EEA Grants, the Donors agreed in December 2021, after the NFP's proposal, to allocate the reserve amount of €304.800 to PDP4, in order to finance the construction of an independent house in the Agios Loukas community Centre area. This house will accommodate up to eight residents with multiple mental and physical disabilities, for round the clock care, for short and long term. This house will complement the building that is constructed under PDP4 and it will create a highly visible result with great value added to the project. The plan is to build a total of 5 such houses if additional funds become available.

#### PDP 5 - Cyprus Reception Centre for Unaccompanied Minors

In order to proceed with the preparation of the tender documents for the renovation of the building for the purposes of the project, the PP is expecting the building's structural designs by the District Department of Public Works in Larnaca. However due to COVID-19 and work overload, there is a delay in finalizing these designs.

In view of this delay, the PP cannot finalise the tender documents and thus there is a delay on the call for tenders and renovation of the building. As the implementation period is already under way with no results from the part of the involved services, the PO has sent a letter to the Deputy Minister for Social Welfare for immediate action to resolve this matter. The reaction of the Deputy Minister is expected soon.

#### PDP 9 - Solidarity Network Nicosia In Action (NicInAct)

The renovation of the Zemenidis building for the Solidarity Hub, where the social services will be provided, was completed in early 2021. The opening event took place on 30 March 2021 with a wide media coverage, including a live link and Facebook posts by the PP and PO.

The Solidarity Hub is in full operational mode and the total number of beneficiaries served from March 2021 until the end of December 2021 was 143 through a total number of 671 sessions. More specifically, a total of 18 sessions for legal services, 16 sessions for family budget advice, and 582 sessions for psychosocial support. Another 20 sessions were implemented for consultation support, 30 sessions for employment consultation, 3 sessions for entrepreneurship consultation and 2 sessions for occupational therapy services.

The actors that are working together with the PP for providing services to beneficiaries signed a number of MOU. The signature ceremony of the MOU with a total of 34 actors



took place at the Nicosia Municipal Theatre on 3 June 2021 and the event initiated the operation of the actors' network.

The project was well publicized both through physical exhibitions and interaction with the public during street work and in the framework of public events where the foundation was invited to present the project.

In addition, activities implemented in collaboration with partners and other actors were also publicized through social media, such as the UNHCR training that was implemented on 13/7/2021, for the staff and partners of the foundation.

In order to publicize the street work, the street social worker informed the public at Nicosia city-centre on the services offered by the project and for the street social work. The event was publicized on social media on 18/9. The project NIC-IN-ACT was also presented at the UPSKILL Festival at Eleftheria Square (in Nicosia city-centre), where the project and its services were promoted to the public and a relevant post was published on 26/9.

In the framework of the provision of social services, the Minister of Labour and Social Insurance visited the premises of the Zemenidi building and discussed with the PP on the services offered by the project. The Minister provided a very positive feedback to PP about the project and she confirmed the availability of the Ministry and especially of the social welfare services for cooperation with the Nicosia Multifunctional Foundation for the benefit of vulnerable populations in Nicosia.

In the framework of the allocation of the Reserve amount of the Norway Grants, the Donors agreed in December 2021, after the NFP's proposal, to allocate the reserve amount of €42.500 to PDP9, in order to implement further activities. This amount will re-enforce the activities provided to serve more beneficiaries, as the programme has already been successful with a lot of people benefiting from it.

#### Outcome 4: Strengthened capacity of businesses on Corporate Social Responsibility Pre-defined projects

#### PDP 1 - Corporate Sustainability Supporting Framework

The project has been appraised by the PO and the contract was signed on 26 April 2021. After the signing of the contract, the Project Promoter began the preparatory stage of drafting the subsidising scheme. In this context, the PP reviewed several issues, inter alias, the competency requirements of persons providing consulting services on Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) as well as for validating /verifying the CSR strategy developed by enterprises, according to the criteria of the Tool (Specification).



The draft of the subsidizing scheme is on its final stage and is expected to be published in early 2022.

Market research and preliminary consultations were conducted with interested software developing firms and promotional firms, regarding venue and electronic equipment needed for the informative/ training sessions. Furthermore, preliminary consultations were also conducted with interested educators /trainers on CSR.

#### **Bi-Communal Cooperation**

Most of the pre-defined projects have a bi-communal character, as the Turkish Cypriots can benefit from the services offered/results achieved by the projects, such as the Nicosia-in-action, the Childhood cancer Diagnostic Laboratory, the New Infrastructure of diagnosis and treatment of patients, the Centre for Children and Adolescents with Neuro-Developmental Disorders, the Multifunctional Community Centre for people with special needs as well as the Assessment of Climate Change Effects on Pollution Transport in Cyprus.

It is noted that for the Nicosia-in-Action project that is fully operational, services have been provided to a number of people of various nationalities, including Turkish Cypriots.

Also, projects such as the Nicosia-in-Action and the Multifunctional Community Centre for people with special disabilities, will include in their websites a description of their projects in the Turkish language and interpretation, when needed, will be ensured for all patient/user groups.

As the projects have a social inclusion, health and an environmental character, anyone in need can get support or benefit from, as all the services provided by the project promoters are accessible to all people living in Cyprus, including the Turkish Cypriots.

#### 3. Implementation

#### Financial status

#### **Conformity with specific requirements**

There are seven conditions that are stipulated in the Programme Agreement and should be met for the implementation of the Programme. These are the following:

- 1) The NFP in its dual role as Programme Operator shall ensure that the project promoters,
  - Keep any buildings purchased, constructed, renovated or reconstructed under the
    project in their ownership for a period of at least 5 years following the completion of
    the project and continue to use such buildings for the benefit of the overall objectives
    of the project for the same period;
  - Keep any buildings purchased, constructed, renovated or reconstructed under the project properly insured against losses such as fire, theft and other normally insurable incidents both during project implementation and for at least 5 years following the completion of the project; and
  - Set aside appropriate resources for the maintenance of any buildings purchased, constructed, renovated or reconstructed under the project for at least 5 years following the completion of the project. The specific means for implementation of this obligation shall be specified in the project contract.
- 2) The National Focal Point in its dual role as Programme Operator shall ensure that the project promoters refrain from any acts or omissions that:
  - Are incompatible with the property rights of natural or legal persons protected under the applicable laws of the Republic of Cyprus, the Convention for the Protection of Human Right and Fundamental Freedoms or the case law of the European Court of Human Rights;
  - Imply acceptance of entry or exit points of the Republic of Cyprus beyond those that are compatible with international law.



- 3) Payments to project promoters and, if applicable, project partners shall only be made through legally operating banking institutions in the Republic of Cyprus.
- 4) Any supporting evidence for expenditures provided for payments shall not be considered eligible if these are derived from a so-called "public authority" or any other so-called "official institution" in the areas of the Republic of Cyprus where the Government of the Republic of Cyprus does not exercise effective control and authority.
- 5) The overall objective of bi-communal projects and their guiding principle is to contribute the reunification of Cyprus as set out in the relevant UN Security Council resolutions.
- 6) Bi-communal activities and bilateral partnerships shall be encouraged within all relevant projects.
- 7) No action or omission of the project promoters or any project partners is intended to imply recognition of any public authority in Cyprus, other than the Government of the Republic of Cyprus.

All the above conditions have been addressed in the Project contracts signed with the PPs and in the checklist of the PO prepared for assessing the progress of the Projects.

It is noted that the PO ensures that the conditions are met through the monitoring of the implementation of the projects by the PPs and through the evaluation of the Project Progress Reports submitted by the PPs during the year.

#### **Progress by the Joint Committee on Bilateral Funds**

In accordance with Article 2.3 of the Bilateral Fund Agreement signed on 21/8/2019, the Joint Committee for Bilateral Funds (JCBF) held its second meeting on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of March 2021. Present at the meeting were representatives from the Donors (the Norwegian Embassy in Athens, the Embassy of Iceland in Stockholm), the Cypriot Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the FMO and the NFP.

At the second meeting, a status update on the approved pre-defined bilateral initiatives was presented by the NFP. As noted at the meeting, due to COVID-19, there was a delay in the implementation of the approved activities, since they included site visits, seminars etc. However, the project promoters were in close contact with their bilateral partners and some of them proceeded with on line sessions.

The main conclusions of the JCBF were related to the challenges COVID-19 brought to the PPs where they should find new ways to implement their bilateral initiatives, find new bilateral partners and try to adapt to the new situation.



In view of the above, the Cyprus NFP is in close cooperation with the FMO and the Norwegian Embassy in Athens so as to assist the implementation of more bilateral initiatives. More specifically, the FMO will organize an online workshop on 26 January 2022 where all the PPs and other interested stakeholders have been invited to join in order to get informed on the Bilateral Funds, find new ways to cooperate with bilateral partners and propose new initiatives.

As far as the progress of the implementation of the four bilateral initiatives approved by the JCBF is concerned, this is shown in **Table 1** below:

#### Management and control system (MCS)

#### MCS of the NFP/CA/IA/AA

During the year, a systems review was carried out by the Audit Authority and it was brought to the attention of the NFP that an established audit procedure shall be incorporated in the MCS of the NFP, Certifying Authority, Irregularities Authority and Audit Authority, with regards to Technical Assistance and Bilateral Fund.

The relevant verification procedures were incorporated in the MCS, after mutually agreed with the CA and AA, under the section of the MCS on the Certifying Authority, which is the Authority in charge for the verification of these funds.

In view of the change in the name of DG EPCD to DG Growth, Ministry of Finance, on 21/12/2021, the MCS for the NFP/CA/IA/AA has been amended to include the new name of the NFP.



#### MCS of the PO

During the year all projects were subject to verification by the appointed external audit firm in accordance with the regulation of EEA and Norway Grants and the terms established in the MCS for the PO. The results were satisfactory and in accordance with guidelines provided as per the MCS. The verification procedure is ongoing and it is monitored accordingly.

The MCS for the PO was also updated to include the change of the name of the NFP from DG EPCD to DG Growth, Ministry of Finance, as well as to include the name of Mr. Pambos Charalambous as part of the PO team, in replacement of Ms Dafni Mavrommati.

#### C. LEARNING

#### 1. Monitoring

The PO had regular online meetings with all the Project Promoters throughout 2021, so as to have a regular update on the project implementation and assist the PPs in any issues/problems that might arise. The PO had also a very frequent communication with all the PPs via email and telephone calls.

The Monitoring Plan is provided in Annex 5 to this Report.

#### 2. Evaluation

In this reporting period, no external evaluations have been carried out.

However, following the submission of the Progress Reports by the PPs, in intervals of 3 or 6 months, the PO conducted desk-based reviews, on-line meetings and site-visits, accordingly.

Furthermore, based on the lessons learned from previous programming periods, the PO created a better system to evaluate and monitor the projects.

#### 3. Lessons learned

In view of the experience and lessons learned from the implementation of programmes in the previous programming periods, the NFP/PO organized on-line meetings and had regular contacts by email and telephone calls, with all the PPs in order to better monitor the implementation of the projects. In these meetings/contacts, the NFP/PO discussed with the PPs the project progress and noted if there were any issues/problems during the year.



In order to further assist the PPs in the implementation process, the NFP/PO in cooperation with the FMO and the Norwegian Embassy in Athens, organized on-line trainings so as to provide additional help and clear possible enquiries from the part of the PPs.

Furthermore, due to COVID-19, some of the project activities have been affected, as there is a high rate of COVID-19—patients within the PPs' organisations, thus making it more difficult to procced with the activities as planned. In view of this, PPs proceeded with the implementation of some of their activities in different time frames than the planned ones, in order to minimize any delays in the implementation of the projects. Also, on-line communication and meetings were established in the daily work of the PPs.



#### **Annex 2: Communication summary**

#### a. Visibility of the Grants and the donors



#### b. Website and social media

This website will be updated with information from the NFP/PO as well as the PPs. The NFP is in the final stage of updating the website according to the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines for the visually impaired. More specifically, the website will have a new format and its content will be updated. The main aim is that the website will be more modern and user friendly so visitors can easily find all relevant information.

The NFP/PO is posting on its social media accounts (Facebook and Instagram), news, information and photos from the projects to promote their activities and increase visibility, whilst also promoting other activities relevant to the grants, such as trainings and events organized, with the overarching goal to increase awareness to the general public. More specifically, the NFP/PO will create and post to all its social media accounts videos of each of the 12 projects. The aim is to create and show the story for each project, from start to finish, so as to show the progress and the results achieved.

The general public which is one of the main target groups of the communication plan will be able to observe the results achieved on all the projects implemented under the EEA and Norway Grants.

#### c. Best practice examples

### PDP7 - Reduction of risk of damage caused by wildfires in Cyprus' forests:

The PP of the PDP7 has developed two video spots with the cooperation of the Press and Information Office (PIO) that were used for TV and Radio Campaigns. The main idea was to create awareness as to how to prevent the outbreak of fires and protect the environment. Awareness is critical since according to forest fire statistics, 9 out of 10 forest fires are caused by human activities, most of which due to negligence.


#### PDP9 - Solidarity Network Nicosia In Action (NicInAct):

The project of the PDP9 has been promoted through the Alpha Cyprus TV channel. More specifically, the project manager of the project presented the mission and services provided at the Solidarity Hub through a live link at the premises of the Zemenidis building. Many social media posts and shares followed and gave widespread publicity to the project.

Additionally, a social media campaign ran and the public was invited to submit an application for programmes of the foundation through the online platform i.e. for the open special school as well as for the services provided within the NICINACT project. Also, NICINACT was present at the UPSKILL Festival at Eleftheria Square, the central square in Nicosia, where the project and its services were promoted to the public and a relevant post was published.

#### PDP10 - Childhood Cancer Diagnostic Laboratory:

The PP of PDP10 created three small TV spots for Donor Recruitment. The main idea behind the films was to show that any person, can become a donor and that any person can be a patient. The spots were shot in different places with different people, e.g. a flower shop to show an employee who was a donor and then the hospital to show the patient, a tapestry shop to show that a tapestry salesperson can become a donor and then the bedroom of a child, to show the patient, and lastly a garbage collection truck, to show that



a garbage collector can become a donor and then the house of a young couple, to show the patient. The ending of each film was done at the Karaiskakion Foundation, where it all starts, with a "swap" from a newly registered donor. The films were playing on all major TV channels during the whole month of September 2021. The end result was to increase the donor's registry by 2000 donors and achieve more registries than the targeted.

### d. Multimedia

A number of the PPs (e.g. PDP 7 - Wildfires, PDP 9 - Nicosia-in-action and PDP 10 - Karaiskakio) created TV spots or videos that were uploaded in their social media accounts but also promoted through TV and Radio channels.


